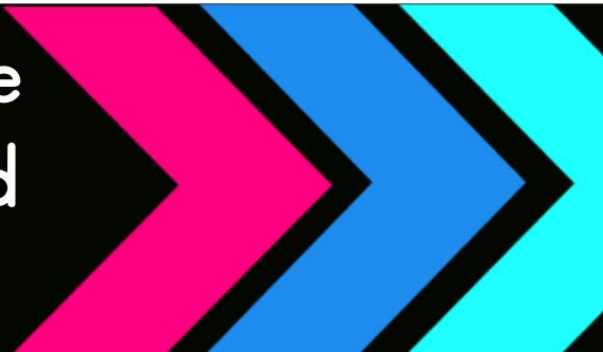

STEP 1:

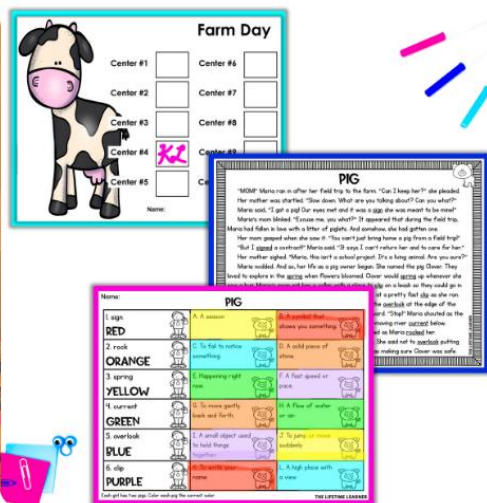
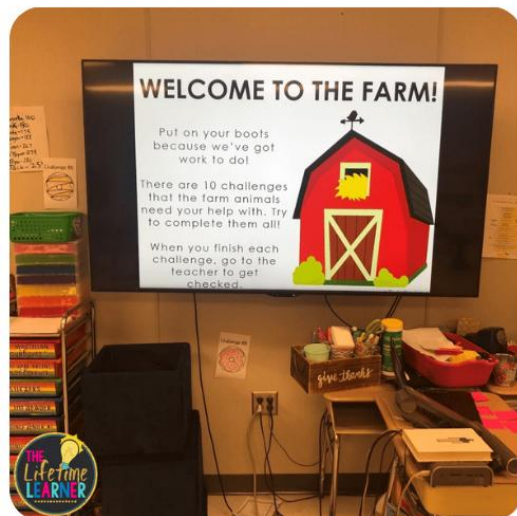
Tell your class they are farmers today!
