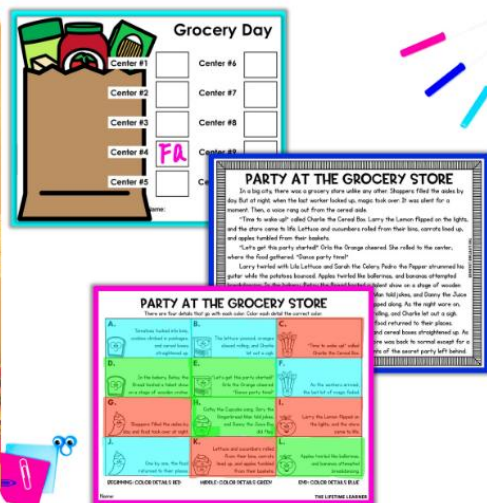

STEP 1:

Tell your class they are in a grocery store today!

They will complete sequence of events activities set up around the room. You can do this for a day, a few days, or over the course of a week!



Set-up is quick and easy.

Simply print the posters, 10 activities, and a recording sheet for each student. Place them around your room and you're ready to begin!

STEP 2:

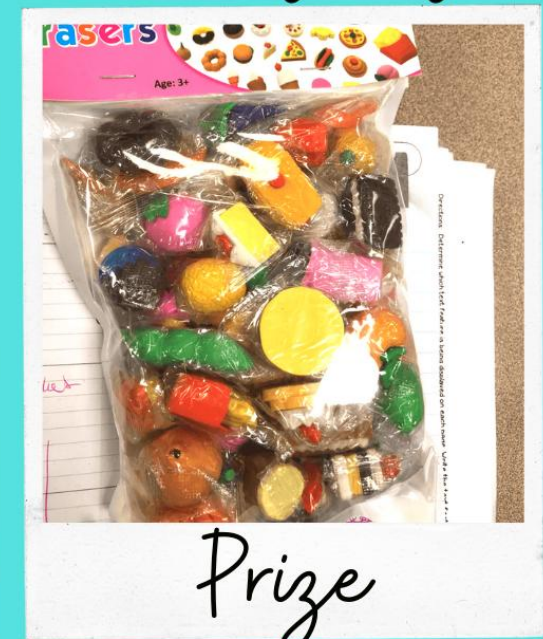
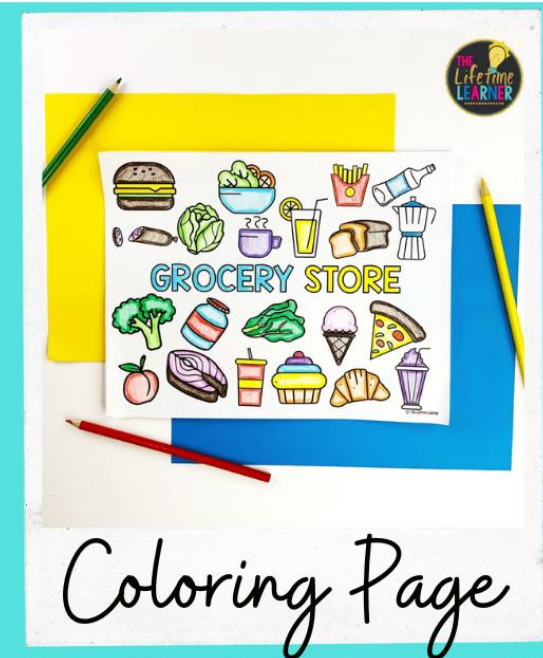
STEP 3:
